

The location of the station meant that as tourism started in the region, Curtin Springs saw more visitors.

1956 – 6 visitors, 1957 – 9 visitors

Peter and Dawn Severin were instrumental in the development of the tourism sector based around the then Ayers Rock.

They opened their home and then put in the first infrastructure to support this developing industry. They provided the rescue and support services.

March of the Quandongs



The landscape around Mt Conner is very fragile and we restrict vehicles and other access to identified roads.

BUT - the Curtin Springs Walks needed to have a couple of simple access tracks cut for us to provide emergency access if needed. We found the March of the Quandongs.



March of the Quandongs



A stand of more than 200 quandong trees.

Giving Curtin Springs the highest number of recorded quandongs in one location in the NT and an estimate of 30-50% of all recorded trees in the NT.

We have set up two plots for monitoring and have had them recorded using methodology that allows for comparison across land tenures. This type of comparison is all but non-existent. Monitoring of a range of issues usually only occurs on one land type or the other.

Using comparative processes our stand is as healthy as stands in national parks and in better condition than stands on Aboriginal managed lands.


We share of our pristine environmental assets with visitors, raising awareness of our commitment and processes to a very wide audience and we host a lot of different groups and film crews.
