















Bioregions: MacDonnell Ranges



A conservationist is calling for a "conversation" on banning pet cats in Alice Springs after a feral cat video monitoring project showed domestic cats were also hunting wildlife.

Jen Kreusser from the not-for-profit group Land for Wildlife acknowledged a cat ban was a touchy topic, but argued it was something that should be discussed.

"We feel like there's not very much awareness that cats do roam around at night [and] the ecological impact that they can have," she said.

"Regardless of whether they're domestic or feral they're instinctive, carnivorous hunters that they're out there catching lizards and birds and other small mammals."

For six weeks Ms Kreusser monitored remote cameras in six urban yards around Alice Springs to see where cats were moving and what they were RELATED STORY: Fact check: Are feral cats killing over 20 billion native animals a year?


