- Members and vols recruitment turnover and need for succession planning
- Effort and time to work together

The collaboration project

- Territory NRM supported project between Ludmilla Creek Landcare and Friends of East Point Groups, aiming to work with Larrakia organisations
- Shared methods
- Shared labour force
 - Weed & grass control
 - Watering regimes
 - Hole digging
 - Plantings & Events
 - Ongoing maintenance









OUTCOMES

- 2 major planting events
 - 40 and 35 participants
- 630 plants
 - 70% 85% survival rates
- 12 key volunteers
- 10Ha managed for weed control
 - targeted spot spraying in healthy areas and slashing in dense weed areas

AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT

- Engagement with Larrakia Nation and Rangers
 - Organisational issues
 - Volunteer weekend work vs Week-day ranger work
- Fire control issues at East Point
- Adjoining properties source of weeds & grasses

OUTCOMES – Future Directions

- Collaboration has delivered new ideas, improved working outcomes, and new community participation.
- Raised the need for better planning, including membership succession, and for building ongoing capacity to identify and reach out to additional potential collaborators.
- Potential need to have (limited) paid coordination to assist with
 - Week-day collaboration,
 - Agency engagement and
 - Neighbour negotiations

- Clear ongoing commitment to collaboration
- Commencement of strategic vision for the Ludmilla Creek catchment
- Common approach to working with neighbours, engaging supporters and creating community involvement
